

# THE WHITE DEATH

f all the natural phenomena peculiar to the Rocky mountain region none is more strange, or terrible than the mysterious storm known to the Indians as "the white death". Scientific men have never yet had an opportunity of investigating it, because it comes at the most unexpected times and may keep away from a certain locality for years. Well-read men who have been through it say that it is really a frozen fog. But where the fog comes from is more than anyone can say. This phenomenon occurs most frequently in the northern part of Colorado, in Wyoming, and occasionally in Montana.

About two years ago a party of three women and two men were crossing North Park in a wagon in the month of February. The air was bitterly cold, but dry as a bone and motionless. The sun shone with almost startling brilliancy. As the five people drove along over the crisp snow they did not experience the least cold, but really felt most comfortable, and rather enjoyed the trip. Mountain peaks fifty miles away could be seen as distinctly as the pine trees beside the roadside.

Suddenly one of the women put her hand up to her face and remarked that something had stung her. Then other members of the party did the same thing, although not a sign of an insect could be seen. All marveled greatly at this. A moment later they noticed that the distant mountains were disappearing behind a cloud of mist. Mist in Colorado in February? Surely there must be some mistake. But there was no mistake, because within ten minutes a gentle wind began to blow and the air became filled with fine particles of something that scintillated like diamond dust in the sunshine. Still the people drove on until they came to a cabin where a man signaled them to stop. With his head tied up in a bundle of mufflers, he rushed out and handed the driver a piece of paper on which was written: 'Come into the house quick, or this storm will kill all of you. Don't talk outside here."

Of course no time was lost in getting under cover and putting the horses in the stable. But they were a little too late, for in less than an hour the whole party was sick with violent coughs and fever. Before the next morning one of the women died with all the symptoms of pneumonia. The others were violently ill of it, but managed to pull through after long sickness. - Aisle's Magazine

# Kuzma Murder Trial Underway Here

Twenty-eight witnesses were scheduled to be heard in the murder trial of Nicholas Kuzma in connection with the August 18, 1961 death of Canadian Customs man Roy Wilson. Kuzma was arrested in Haines on the 20th.

Because the charge is one of non-capital murder Mr. Justice John Parker told the jurors he wold not confine them during the trial. Kuzma is being defended by Gordon King with Stuart Enderton as crown prosecutor. The trial commenced Tuesday and should end tomor-

Wilson's bruised and bloody body was found lying about fifty feet from the Alaska Highway at mile 1207.3 on the west side of the right-of-way by Customs Officer Clayton Skelton. Wilson was wounded 11 times about the neck and chest, his face was gashed and bruised and his upper right forearm was broken.

Dr. W. R. Buchan yesterday told the court Wilson died from a wound in his heart. His jugular vein was punctured and also his windpipe. Shown a jackhandle which RCMP Cpl. Steve Penteliuk of Haines Junction found near the body, Dr. Buchan agreed a tool of that nature could have caused some of the wounds.

Evidence showed that Kuzma and Wilson had been travelling together on the night of August 17. They spent about six hours at the bar of Seaton's Lodge in Alaska at Mile 1235. William Seaton owner of the lodge, testified Wilson had been obnoxious for about two hours of his stay and had used obscene language. At one point Seaton offered to hit Wilson unless he apologized to Mrs. Seaton for a remark made to her. The two men had been at the lodge separately on other occasions but this was their first visit together.

Seaton also described a fight which

took place outside his lodge in the parking area after Wilson and Kuzma had left early in the morning of the 18th. He told the court he had seen Wilson hitting at Kuzma while Kuzma sat in the driver's seat of the car and Wilson stood outside. Then Kuzma got out, knocked Wilson down and placed one knee on him, hitting Wilson several times. After this they drove away together.

RCMP Cpl. James Ballentyne, who is with the identification branch, described the scene where the body was found. He said there were tire marks between the soft shoulder of the road and the beginning of the bush. They crossed the ditch that separated them. The bush was quite dense but appeared to have been trampled upon. Wilson was lying on is back with one arm across his chest. His shirt was open with all but one button missing. He was wearing only one shoe and sock. A black leather shoe was found 30 feet from the body and a sock was found hanging on a nearby bush. A few feet from the body there was an area covered by a "red substance" about one foot in

Cpl. Ballantyne said there were "scrape" indications on the back of Wilson's trousers.

Cpl. N.P. Schiml of the RCMP lab at Regina testified regarding a jack and jack handle mechanism. He said the jackhandle could have made marks that appeared on the mechanism but he could not positively identify them. The jack mechanism had been found in Kuzma's car.

Miss Marlene Pierce from the police lab said she had identified blood on the jack handle but could not identify the

Wilma Lee and Russell Allan, both of whom were at Seaton's on the night in question, testified regarding Wilson's unruly behaviour. Mrs. Lee said Roy Wilson appeared to be trying to start trouble while Nick Kuzma tried to settle him down.

She saw Kuzma again the next morning at White River Lodge where she was then residing. He appeared to be "more or less in a state of shock."

Traveler Garth Fuller from Iowa recalled seeing a man without a shirt step from a car a few miles North of the Canadian Customs early on the 19th and motion him to stop. Fuller did not stop. Later, as he was leaving the customs office, a man who appeared to be the same person drove up to the office.

Customs Officer Clayton Skelton met Kuzma as Fuller was leaving the border office. Kuzma told him there had been a little trouble at Seaton's. He said Wilson had asked him to speak to Clayton concerning having someone else cover his shift as he would not be back for a day or two.

He claimed Wilson had been making a pass at a girl and the man she was with had become angry. Then, Kuzma told Mr. Skelton, Roy had got mad and refused to return with him.

Later in the day Mr. Skelton drove to Snag where he spoke to Russell Allan. On his return to the customs office at about 6 p.m. he spoke to customs officer Ken Watts and as a result of these conversations, drove along the highway to the vicinity of Mile 1207.3 with a friend, Lilly Ewchuk, looking for car tracks in the ditch. Miss Ewchuk spotted Wilson's body.

Note: Nicholas Kuzma, 37, was sentenced to fourteen years in jail after being found guilty of manslaughter in the death August 18, 1961 of Roy C. Wilson, Canadian Customs official. Mr. Justice John Parker imposed the sentence.
