1902 News from the Whitehorse Star

The "Short Man" Captured

Dawson, Feb. 28 — Wm. Brophy, the "short man" in the Dominion gambling house holdup which occurred here last fall, and for whom a reward of \$500 was offered, was captured last midnight at a roadhouse eight miles from Dawson on Bonanza Creek by four N.W.M.P.

He carried a rifle, but had no chance to use it as the police jumped on him from behind. In the scuffle that ensued Brophy was shot, but not dangerously. He was brought to Dawson and placed in jail this morning. All three men connected with the robbery (Tomelin, Harris, and Brophy) are now in custody.

Brophy held up a man on Bonanza four nights ago, robbing him of four ounces of gold dust, and it was from a description of the robber, given by the victim, that Brophy's whereabouts became known.

A GRIM DEATH INDEED

Of all the accidents that can befall a person on a boat surely an explosion and fire is one of the worst. Three tons of black powder exploded on the Columbian's forward deck that fateful September day and the resulting fireball was carried the length of the ship by a downstream wind. Everyone in the immediate vicinity of the explosion would die, except for passenger Ernest Winstanley. He would be saved by his long underwear.

The Purser, Lionel Cowper had been burned over his entire body. As was the medical custom at the time of the accident, he had been wrapped in an oily blanket and given strychnine pills. In Whitehorse, when it became obvious that he was going to die, massive amounts of "opiates" were administered, but relief lasted only minutes.

New Kind of Hydraulic

From the Yukon (Dawson) Sun 12th inst: Several sleigh loads of machinery are expected from the outside today, which may be the initiatory step toward the revolutionizing of the mining industry of the north. The consignment is for the N.A.T.&T. Co., and consists of an experimental plant called the Adams hydraulic lift. It will be installed at once at No. 63 below on Bonanza, under the personal supervision of J.H. Adams, its inventor.

The plant was built in San Francisco especially for the Klondike test. The plan of operation is different from the ordinary hydraulic work, and as the name implies it is in the nature of a lift, whereby gravel can be raised into a sluice box from a point many-feet below. Its principle is similar to a centrifugal pump. The apparatus contains two main pipes, one of which by gravity plays on the bed of gravel and forces it upward through another pipe into a sluice box. Mr. Adams in an interview, said:

“The introduction of the invention is merely an experiment, and much difficulty is apprehended in bringing it to a successful basis of operation. The objectionable features in the north are many.

“In the first place where we intend to experiment the lay of the ground prohibits a bedrock flume to carry away the residue from the works. Again, where heretofore the grav-

ity system has been employed the water must be pumped on Bonanza.

“The plants are now successfully operating in all parts of the world. I have opened up propositions in South Africa, South America, Mexico and Korea. In every case the ground has been handled economically and with great profit to the owners.

“If the results from the Bonanza efforts are all that are anticipated, an order for a number of mammoth plants will at once be given, which will be operated in various parts of the Yukon.

“The beneficial results that will, under these circumstances, accrue to the mining industry of the country cannot be estimated. Ground that is now considered absolutely worthless will pay big returns. To the owners of ground that is fairly rich it will men increased profits.

“The general production of the country would be greatly increased in the saving of many millions of dollars which now go to waste by the present system of mining.

“The N.A.T.&T. Co., realizes the vast benefits to be derived if the idea is successful, and on this basis is willing to spend considerable money and time to demonstrate the feasibility of the new invention.”

PERCY DE WOLFE
IRON MAN
OF THE NORTH

Dawson News, April 28, 1919: Percy De Wolfe, the lower Yukon River mail carrier, of the Dawson-Eagle route, broke through the ice while traveling the river Saturday and had a thrilling experience in which he barely escaped losing his life.

Two fine horses, valued at \$600, which he was driving, went through the ice at the same time, and were lost in the river.

The accident occurred near the Halfway House, between Dawson and Fortymile. De Wolfe’s home is at the Halfway House. When a mile below the place he was jogging along easily, and started to turn from the track he was following to a winter trail. He had gone but a little way from his old course when there was a crash of the ice, and the horses went through. He was near the bank of the river, and away from the swift water.

The sleigh remained on the edge of the unbroken ice, with a single tree hanging over. De Wolfe attempted to get the head of the horses above the ice, but the first he knew he was in the water in the midst of the animals. The horses, immediately on going through the ice, began pawing desperately, and were encumbered by their harness. Percy, in his effort to get out, was grazed down the back by the foot of one of the horses, and his overalls torn open near the waist. Had a hoof struck him he would have been forced down, and no doubt would have passed under the animal and then under the ice.

Fortunately he came up close to the overhanging single tree. He was plunging up and down in the water, in the grim attempt to save himself. It was almost impossible to get hold of the edge of the ice and crawl out, but he reached for the single tree. Two grasps were made with no avail. The third time was the charm. He got a good grip on the object and gradually lifted himself from the chilly waters.

By the time Percy had rescued himself the horses had disappeared. Although soaked to the skin from head to foot, he removed the mail to the shore, and left it in a safe position. He then proceeded to his home a mile above the scene of the accident. The sleigh was recovered later.

De Wolfe got here yesterday with a dog team and the mail. The horses which he lost were uninsured. He states it will be necessary to get another team to carry on his mail business next season. De Wolfe has traveled the Yukon between Dawson and Eagle as mail carrier for years, never daunted by cold, bad ice, storm or other adversities. Several times before this he has fallen through the ice, and has lost horses and sleighs, but despite the great perils he has encountered, he seems to bear a charmed life, and has emerged unscratched each time. Winter after winter he has forged through the most severe of arctic temperatures, and always has made his destination on time. The moderate sum he receives as compensation for carrying on this dangerous route is a pittance compared to that received on some other routes where the risks comparatively are nil. His losses in this experience wipes out the profits of months of hard labor.

IRON MAN – Percy De Wolfe continued on the job until 1950 and he died a year later. During his 40 year career he developed a reputation for stamina and dependability that was never tarnished no matter how cold or precarious the weather. In his honour the Percy De Wolfe Memorial Mail Run was organized by the Klondike Visitors Association in 1977, this proved so popular that it graduated to being a full blown race in 1981 and is now one of the qualifying events for the famous Iditarod.

MAKING A DELIVERY – Percy De Wolfe ca. 1930 with horse drawn sleigh De Wolfe became known as the “Iron Man of the North” due to the 1919 adventure and other exploits during his mail carrying career. De Wolfe, a Nova Scotian by birth, arrived in the territory during the Gold Rush of ‘98, and began his career as mail carrier in 1910. Depending on the season, mail and freight was carried by dog or horse drawn sleigh, or boat and the 340 kilometre round trip journey between Eagle, Alaska and Dawson City, Yukon took 8 days.

THE WHITE DEATH

f all the natural phenomena peculiar to the
Rocky mountain region none is more strange,
or terrible than the mysterious storm known
to the Indians as “the white death”. Scientific men have
never yet had an opportunity of investigating it, because
it comes at the most unexpected times and may keep away
from a certain locality for years. Well-read men who have
been through it say that it is really a frozen fog. But where
the fog comes from is more than anyone can say. This
phenomenon occurs most frequently in the northern part
of Colorado, in Wyoming, and occasionally in Montana.

About two years ago a party of three women and two
men were crossing North Park in a wagon in the month
of February. The air was bitterly cold, but dry as a bone
and motionless. The sun shone with almost startling bril-
liancy. As the five people drove along over the crisp snow
they did not experience the least cold, but really felt most
comfortable, and rather enjoyed the trip. Mountain peaks
fifty miles away could be seen as distinctly as the pine
trees beside the roadside.

Suddenly one of the women put her hand up to her face
and remarked that something had stung her. Then other
members of the party did the same thing, although not a
sign of an insect could be seen. All marveled greatly at
this. A moment later they noticed that the distant moun-
tains were disappearing behind a cloud of mist. Mist in
Colorado in February? Surely there must be some mistake.
But there was no mistake, because within ten minutes a
gentle wind began to blow and the air became filled with
fine particles of something that scintillated like diamond
dust in the sunshine. Still the people drove on until they
came to a cabin where a man signaled them to stop. With
his head tied up in a bundle of mufflers, he rushed out and
handed the driver a piece of paper on which was written:
“Come into the house quick, or this storm will kill all of
you. Don’t talk outside here.”

Of course no time was lost in getting under cover and
putting the horses in the stable. But they were a little too
late, for in less than an hour the whole party was sick with
violent coughs and fever. Before the next morning one of
the women died with all the symptoms of pneumonia. The
others were violently ill of it, but managed to pull through
after long sickness. - Aisle’s Magazine

THE
‘DISCOVERY WELL’

Little was it thought when
the original “Discovery Well”
was drilled in 1928 in the Fort
Norman area that, through the
exigencies of war, the oil that
flowed from there would be
piped to Whitehorse, a distance
of 595 miles, and refined here.
The transportation of men and
equipment over a road more
than a thousand miles long was
one of the major obstacles en-
countered and overcome. Camps,
warehouses and platforms were
constructed and pre-fabricated,
barges, tugs assembled and
Camp Canol was established.

In June 1942 the U.S. Engin-
eer troops arrived in Waterways,
a small frontier town northeast
of Edmonton, and the men of
the navigation system in Nor-
man Wells on the Mackenzie
River. By the summer of 1943
the water system had been well
established, in the meantime
another route from Dawson
Creek, B.C. to Whitehorse on
the Alaska Highway had been
opened. This pioneer road was
completed in November 1942
and converted into an all-weather
military highway by October
1943.

As the transportation systems
came into operation crews start-
ed from Whitehorse and Norman
Wells to construct the Canol ac-
cess road at both ends. This road
was completed in December 31,
1943 and in the following Feb-
ruary (1944) the first weld was
made in the 595-mile pipeline.
On April 30, 1944 the official
opening of the refinery was fit-
tingly commemorated.
