Liquor Tax Is Imposed
By Government

An Ordinance to provide for Government control and sale of alcoholic liquors replaces the old Liquor Ordinance and the Beer Ordinance.

Changes made are that all licensed premises, beer taverns and cocktail lounges must close between the hours of 6 p.m. and 7 p.m. daily. Provision is also made to allow establishments operating a beer parlour or tavern and also serving meals, provided the establishment is 25 miles from the limits of a municipality, to serve beer with meals up to two bottles per person.

A tax of 10¢ per dozen bottles of beer, 10¢ per bottle of wine, 10¢

per flask of liquor and 25¢ per bottle of liquor will be imposed to provide funds for education and recreational projects.

It is expected that \$10,000 annually will be derived in this manner for the use of recreational or other desirable projects such as civic centres, etc.

POLL TAX

Payable by all males eighteen years or over except if they have had residence in the Yukon Territory for one year immediately prior to January 1st of the year in which the tax is imposed. This requires one year’s residence in Yukon from January 1st to December 31st.

A GRIM DEATH
INDEED

Of all the accidents that can befall a person on a boat surely an explosion and fire is one of the worst. Three tons of black powder exploded on the Columbian’s forward deck that fateful September day and the resulting fireball was carried the length of the ship by a downstream wind. Everyone in the immediate vicinity of the explosion would die, except for passenger Ernest Winstanley. He would be saved by his long underwear.

The Purser, Lionel Cowper had been burned over his entire body. As was the medical custom at the time of the accident, he had been wrapped in an oily blanket and given strychnine pills. In Whitehorse, when it became obvious that he was going to die, massive amounts of “opiates” were administered, but relief lasted only minutes.

MARTHA BENJAMIN - 1963

MARTHA BENJAMIN:
CANADIAN CHAMP

“Martha beats them all” a STAR headline proclaimed in 1963 when an Old Crow skier and mother of five children became the first Yukoner to win a national skiing title.

Twenty-five year old Martha Benjamin won the senior women’s cross country skiing title at the Canadian championships in Midland, Ontario. Her time over the 10 kilometre race was 43.29 minutes. And in 1989, 26 years after that historic event, Benjamin was inducted in the Yukon Sports Hall of Fame. “After all these years, I didn’t expect to receive something like this,” she said. “I just had it in me that I wanted to do it, and I did it,” she said of her win in Midland Ontario.

Benjamin and Ben Charlie were the only two skiers to attend the championships. Charlie ranked 11th in a field of 48. His toughest competition came from a group of Finns from Sudbury who swept the field.

Both skiers brought high credit and distinction (not to mention the publicity) to their community and to the Yukon as a whole. Star correspondent Edith Josie wrote before they left: “I had wire from Mr. Harry at Whitehorse. He said Ben Charlie and Mrs. Martha Benjamin will go to Ottawa for International Olympic Competition for skiers on February 13. Frank Cook will take them out. Everyone is very glad to hear these two will go out long travel. Hope they had good trip. Old Crow is little town and Father Mouchet is training boys and girls for the skiers. Now they even go way out to Ottawa. Sure big surprise for the people in Old Crow.”

Mouchet, an experienced ski instructor for the French army, designed a training program which is now called TEST (Territorial Experimental Ski Training). This program strives to stimulate and motivate children to discover themselves, develop self-reliance through a rigorous training schedule and gain self-confidence through a series of tough, but surmountable challenges.

BOBBY KENNEDY CLIMBS MT. KENNEDY

Mountain and mountain climbing stories in The STAR have always received prominent coverage. One of the interesting climbs was made by the late U.S. Senator Robert Kennedy in March 1965 when he climbed the Canadian mountain named for his brother President John F. Kennedy.

The mountain, 145 miles northwest of Whitehorse, forms a triangle with Mount Alverstone and Mount Hubbard and until that time was the highest (13,905 ft.) unclimbed peak in the St. Elias mountains.

When the mountain was named for the late President, the National Geographic Society and the Boston Museum of Science decided to conduct a joint survey which would result in a completely detailed map. Bobby Kennedy, though he had never climbed before, joined the party at the last minute and thus the world press became very interested. Newsmen descended on the Yukon in droves but the Whitehorse Star had the first published pictures of the event.

Veteran Everest climber Jim Whittaker of Seattle led the three man party of Kennedy and Barry Prather up the last ridge where they unroped and let the Senator ascend the last 50 yards alone to be the first man on top. It was not a particularly tough climb, as climbs go, but it was a personal pilgrimage for Kennedy, who planted the Kennedy family crest, Canadian flags and National Geographic emblem on the top.

Kennedy Mountain, at the lower camps, was crawling with other members of the climb, military men and helicopters, private planes rented by the media, the ice field research people and anyone else who could scrounge a ride.

A National Film Board crew guided by Whitehorse mountaineer Monty Alford, recorded the climb and Yukoners Bob Erlam, Alex Van Bibber and Wayne MacDonald took pictures which appeared in Life, Time and The Whitehorse Star. The latter three, incidentally, were also present when Kennedy came down that night from the ascent. They fed him steak, instant mashed potatoes, ice cream and the heel of a bottle of Madeira wine which someone (probably Bob) had stashed in a pack sack.

Back in Whitehorse, Kennedy dropped in to the Capital Hotel to get cleaned up and have a drink with the locals. He bought a round and paid for it with a cheque which owner Cal Miller kept and had framed. Said Cal, "I told him I wanted to keep it as a souvenir of the next President of the United States."

BURIED IN TRENCH

Two men were buried in a trench yesterday afternoon at the vocational school site when an earth and gravel wall collapsed on them. Most seriously injured was Ronald Burnett of Whitehorse who received a broken leg and a broken pelvis. Vernon Ekland received also a broken pelvis.

When the wall came down, the two men were working close together in the trench being dug to accommodate sewer and water pipes. They were completely covered by the slide but, fortunately, Bennett and White Superintendent Nelson Ford knew their exact location and, when the rescue effort began, he could pinpoint their location and dug them out.

The trench at the point of collapse was approximately 14 feet deep. About the first five feet were frozen ground but beneath that the gravel was loose. Both city fire departments rushed to the scene and also workmen from other parts of the city were called to assist.

It was Ekland's second trip to the hospital in three weeks. He was just released after a broken ankle healed.
