DAWSON CRIMINAL RE-CAPTURED AFTER A YEAR'S HUNT

SWAN HARRISON, AN INSANE PATIENT ARRESTED IN THE
NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

Swan Harrison, who escaped from the Northwest Mounted police at Selkirk on the Yukon a year ago, has just been captured by members of the same efficient force at a point thousands of miles distant. Harrison has been taken a prisoner in the Northwest territories.

A telegram has been received by Major Wood at Dawson telling him of the capture of Harrison.

When Harrison escaped at Selkirk he was being taken out of the Yukon to New Westminster, B.C. as an insane patient. He had been arrested and convicted at Dawson some time before for stealing, had become insane while in prison and was transferred to the lunatic ward.

While the steamer was lying at Selkirk Harrison made a leap from the boat, and landing partly in the water walked ashore, scrambled away up the bank and ran into the woods before he could be overtaken. He and a number of other lunatics were in charge of Corpl. Stewart on the trip up the river. A short search was made for Harrison, but he could not be found, and the boat proceeded with the remainder of the party.

From traces obtained it is believed he went down the Yukon river and escaped by way of St. Michael or Nome. He is said to be from the States, but how it is that he should wander over into the Northwest Territories is scarcely understood. It was thought at first from the point at which the fellow turned up he must have taken a chance at the famous Edmonton trail and gotten through, but the idea is scarcely credited.

NEW FLAG FLIES

Canada's new flag is flying over Whitehorse tonight, following a simple 10-minute ceremony outside the RCMP barracks at noon which was watched by a few hundred spectators.

Snow was falling as the Union Jack came down and the scarlet-and-white ensign was hoisted in its place. RCMP Staff-Sgt. W.A. Coombs headed the flag party. Commissioner Gordon Cameron and numerous local dignitaries were among the listeners as the Rev. Harold Marston, president of the Whitehorse Ministerial Association, and Bishop Coudert both spoke briefly in a dedication ceremony.

About 150 local school-children took time off to attend the event. It was all over in 10 minutes, and the crowd dispersed quietly, leaving the new flag fluttering in a drizzle of snowflakes. Only two people stood and watched as another flag was raised simultaneously outside the federal building. Earlier this morning, it also flew over the Whitehorse General Hospital.

What's going to happen to all those old Union Jacks? No official word on their fate was available this afternoon.

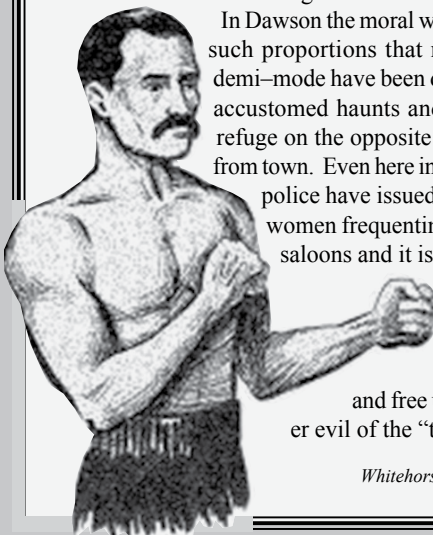

A GANG OF TOUGHS

From present appearances White Horse is a haven of refuge for as tough a set of individuals as ever congregated in a town of this size. Toughs from Dawson, who have been served with "blue papers" by the N.W.M.P.; toughs who have made their presence so obnoxious that even Skagway, which is not famed for its morality, has seen fit to issue orders for their removal; toughs of all descriptions and varieties, from the macquereaux, who live on the earnings of fallen women, to the "mac" and bullying prize fighter, whose highest ambition is to get in some public place and pose before the audience as exponents of the manly art of self defense—these are among the evils which have recently invaded our hitherto peaceful community, like a swarm of locusts on a Kansas farm.

In early days in the northern country it was almost impossible to rid the country of this undesirable element, but things now wear an altogether different aspect. The towns of Yukon territory are being settled up by respectable and law abiding citizens and their families, and the courtesan and her "lover" are no longer looked upon with the same degree of leniency that they were when the population was composed almost entirely of men without family ties or other influences to regulate their daily lives.



In Dawson the moral wave has assumed such proportions that members of the demi-mode have been driven from their accustomed haunts and forced to seek refuge on the opposite side of the river from town. Even here in White Horse the police have issued an edict against women frequenting or patronizing saloons and it is now the duty of those in authority to continue the good work they have begun and free us from the greater evil of the "toughs."

Horses Need Winter Care Too!

Usually, horses can withstand a lot of cold, but they are not invincible. Making sure your horse gets the winter care he deserves can insure a healthy, happy horse all year round.

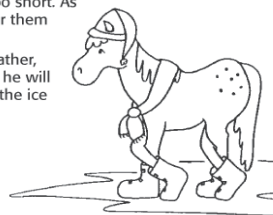
FIRST, make sure your horse gets annual vaccinations for rhinopneumonitis, Eastern and Western encephalomyelitis and tetanus. Get him checked for worms in the fall since he will have more energy if he is not playing host to a load of worms.

NEXT, be sure to have his teeth checked before winter so he can chew his food properly. This is a time he will need to burn more energy to stay warm, therefore increase his ration of hay.

ALSO, one of the most important things to check is that your horse has a clean, dry but well ventilated place to stay. A damp environment can lead to colds, coughs and viral infections. Poor ventilation can cause respiratory diseases while your horse can develop pneumonia if the stable is too hot or too tight. If you don't have a barn, your horse should at least have a three sided shelter, open on the down-wind side. Moist bedding can cause foot infection, so keep it dry.

BESIDES THIS, snow might be deep. Shoes should be pulled, because snow could ball up badly in shod hooves. This makes it difficult for your horse to walk. Trim the hooves enough so they won't crack or break, but not too short. As your horse paws through the snow, he will wear them down, causing sore hooves.

REMEMBER, if exercising your horse in cold weather, give him more time to warm up his muscles so he will be limber. And don't forget to break the ice in his water bucket or trough.

BOBBY KENNEDY CLIMBS MT. KENNEDY

Mountain and mountain climbing stories in The STAR have always received prominent coverage. One of the interesting climbs was made by the late U.S. Senator Robert Kennedy in March 1965 when he climbed the Canadian mountain named for his brother President John F. Kennedy.

The mountain, 145 miles north-west of Whitehorse, forms a triangle with Mount Alverstone and Mount Hubbard and until that time was the highest (13,905 ft.) unclimbed peak in the St. Elias mountains.


When the mountain was named for the late President, the National Geographic Society and the Boston Museum of Science decided to conduct a joint survey which would result in a completely detailed map. Bobby Kennedy, though he had never climbed before, joined the party at the last minute and thus the world press became very interested. Newsmen descended on the Yukon in droves but the Whitehorse Star had the first published pictures of the event.

Veteran Everest climber Jim Whitaker of Seattle led the three man party of Kennedy and Barry Prather up the last ridge where they unroped and let the Senator ascend the last 50 yards alone to be the first man on top. It was not a particularly tough climb, as climbs go, but it was a personal pilgrimage for Kennedy, who planted the Kennedy family crest, Canadian flags and National Geographic emblem on the top.

Kennedy Mountain, at the lower camps, was crawling with other members of the climb, military men and helicopters, private planes rented by the media, the ice field research people and anyone else who could scrounge a ride.

A National Film Board crew guided by Whitehorse mountaineer Monty Alford, recorded the climb and Yukoners Bob Erlam, Alex Van Bibber and Wayne MacDonald took pictures which appeared in Life, Time and The Whitehorse Star. The latter three, incidentally, were also present when Kennedy came down that night from the ascent. They fed him steak, instant mashed potatoes, ice cream and the heel of a bottle of Madeira wine which someone (probably Bob) had stashed in a pack sack.

Back in Whitehorse, Kennedy dropped in to the Capital Hotel to get cleaned up and have a drink with the locals. He bought a round and paid for it with a cheque which owner Cal Miller kept and had framed. Said Cal, "I told him I wanted to keep it as a souvenir of the next President of the United States."

Death of the Rail

A distressing accident occurred on the W.P. & Y. Route yesterday at 11:55 a.m. about two miles south of Frazer station. Two passengers on the last up trip of the Dolphin, after reaching Skagway, decided to walk over the mountain and had reached the point above named when they were overtaken by the north bound train running at a speed of 25 miles an hour.

At the place where the accident happened the snow is piled up on each side of the track to a height of five or six feet, with barely room for the passage of the body of the cars.

One of the men was on top of the snow bank, but the other a German named Hauser, about 35 years of age, six feet tall, weight about 180 pounds, light complexion and light mustache, was on the track. The man on the bank heard the roar of the train and called to his companion, who endeavored to scale the wall of snow; but he was too late and was caught by the snow plow,

thrown under the wheels and frightfully mangled before the train could be brought to a stop. As soon as possible the train crew took the man from underneath the wheels and placed him on board the train, but he expired a very few minutes afterward.

On examination it was found that his arms and legs were ground almost to a pulp and that a portion of is skull had been torn away. The body was brought as far as Bennett and there left to await an inquest.

No blame is attached to the employees of the railroad, as at the time of the accident the train had just rounded a sharp curve and the plow was throwing such a quantity of snow that it was impossible to see anything in front.

It is said the deceased was a resident of Chelan Falls, State of Washington, and leaves a wife and four children.

Wolves Attack Horses

Wolves, within a few miles of Whitehorse, caused the death of one horse and severely injured a second during the weekend. The two animals belonging to Douglas Lowe of 609 Alexander were pursued and bitten about the hindquarters at the northwest end of Marsh Lake.

Mr. Lowe found the wounded animals still on their feet but one was so badly injured he had to shoot it. The horses were part of the plans to use next season as a big game guide and outfitter.

He said he did not know how many wolves were involved but found many tracks in the vicinity adding that, "even one wolf can make plenty of tracks."

Whitehorse West Councillor Bert Boyd gave the okay to Game Director J.B. Fitzgerald to put poison bait out on the ice in an effort to stop the mauraders. This approval is necessary within 75 miles of settled areas

under the recently-amended game ordinance. Outside this radius the game director has full authority with regard to poison bait.

Today Mr. Fitzgerald commented his department was carrying out a poison program within the limits of its financial ability.

Game outfitters and guides see this year as a bad one for game in the Yukon bush. With the snow building a firm crust on which the wolves can travel but the game cannot, moose, caribou, elk and deer are easy prey for the carnivores.

Reports from the Peel River area indicate that the pickings are so good for wolves they are killing caribou and leaving them which is a virtually unheard of occurrence.

Wolves over the NWT border were said to be preying on herds with ease this year. One report told of a thousand animal herd literally hemmed in by wolves in the Nahanni country.

Telephone Service

The next public improvement to be inaugurated in White Horse will be a telephone system. Already the wires have been strung, the switch boards placed in working order and the receiving instruments will be installed next week. The work now being done is of a private nature, but when completed will in all probability be absorbed and become a part of the Yukon Electrical company.

The system being put in is what is known as the Strowger Automatic Telephone, one of the latest and most up-to-date known, by the use of which absolute secrecy is guaranteed to every patron of the line. Each telephone has an automatic sliding dial by turning so that the figures on the dial correspond to a plate beneath. The sender can be automatically connected with any other instrument on the circuit which he may desire. Should the line be in use, connection cannot be made, a

knowledge of this being conveyed to the one wishing to use the same by a slight buzzing sound.

The Strowger Automatic telephone does away with a receiver at the central office. While a message is being sent the central office is disconnected the same as other phones on the circuit, and there is no danger whatever of any communication which you wish to make being conveyed to disinterested parties.

The Strowger Automatic telephone is rapidly replacing companies in the east where central telephone operators are employed, and there is now being formed in Chicago a company with \$5,000,000 capital to put in the system in that city.

The rules for the telephone will at the commencement be \$10 per month for business houses and \$5 per month for residences.
