THE NEW GOLD STRIKE

The first authentic news to be received from the new strike on Livingstone creek in the Big Salmon country is that brought out by Mr. Leonard Matchett who, though not the discoverer, was one of the first locators on the creek. The discoverers were some former employees of Mr. J.C. Tache, who went into the country last summer and, having found good prospects on a tributary of Livingstone creek, took up claims and started to work to reach bedrock, but the ground was frozen so hard and they encountered so much water that they were unable to accomplish much.

Mr. Matchett is a practical miner of over 20 years experience, and last summer worked on the War Eagle mine in White Horse district. Of the new strike, he says: "The discovery was made by the LaRose brothers and others, and is six miles below Livingstone. It is seven miles from the gulch to the summit and 15 miles from there to the Hootalinqua. It is the finest glacial wash I ever saw, and I have been engaged in mining for the past 20 years.

"When I left there were 22 claims recorded and as I met quite a number going in on my outward trip, I suppose by this time there are a great many more.

"I washed out some of the dirt on one of the dumps and as a result secured 5 cwt of gold. The gulch is full of large boulders and it is going to take considerable capital and a good deal of hard work to get down to bedrock, but I am fully convinced from what I have seen that the ground will warrant the outlay.

"After I had staked my claim I went down the river about 100 miles to record, but when I reached the post the recorder was absent. I think some effort should be made by the people of White Horse to have the recorder's office for that

district located here, as it is the proper and most convenient place to have it.

"The much talked of winter trail from White Horse to the Big Salmon should be built at once. It will save half the distance between the two places and is a very easy way to get in. As near as I can estimate, the distance by the cut-off to Livingstone is 80 miles, while by the way of Hootalinqua it is about 160 miles. The worst part of the shorter route is the first four miles out from La Barge, and consists of a few steep bluffs, which, however, can be easily surmounted by building sidehill grades.

The rest of the way is plain sailing until the Hootalinqua is reached, when another grade will have to be made to reach the river. From there on to the mines a good trail has already been built.

"The trade from the Big Salmon country during the coming season is going to be large, and the business men of White Horse ought to get in and work to secure it. On my way out I met a party of 35 men going in under contract to work for Mr. O'Brien of Dawson, and I understand that he intends to increase this force to 80 as soon as he can get things in shape. There are at present about 250 men in the district and in all probability there will be a great many more in a short time. I heard it reported that one company intends to spend \$50,000 in development work during the coming summer.

"At present supplies of all kinds are very high. Flour is \$28 per 100 pounds; bacon 38¢ per pound; ham 50¢; tobacco \$2 and rubber boots \$16 per pair, and very poor boots at that."

ROAD AGENT

Masked Highwayman
Holds Up a Stage in Real
Western Style and Gets \$3.55

Atlin has had a genuine
stage holdup. The work of the
robber was shockingly crude.
His method, or rather lack of
it, demonstrated that he was
not an expert in the profession,
and that he was thoroughly in
want of experience.

It happened Monday even-
ing, Sept. 16, about 8 o'clock.
Walker's stage was enroute to
Pine City from Atlin when a
masked highwayman stepped
out in the road and at the point
of a Winchester commanded the
driver to halt. The com-
mand was obeyed and the
passengers were ordered to get
out of the stage and line up with
their hands in the air. Four of
the passengers, Messrs. D. Pat-
terson, C.H. Dewitt, J. Dillon
and Mrs. Nelson took to the
woods. The others were Driver
Walker, Photographer Draper,
T.Shirley, W. Waters, J.Emmett
and Miss Maud Biggs.

They had considerable
money about them, but most
of them managed to lose their
purses in the stage before
leaving it. The highway-
man's order to them, there-
fore, to throw their money
in a pile on the road resulted
in only \$3.55 being contrib-
uted to the road agent. This
he sulkily picked up, and
backing into the brush, he
disappeared.

The police were immedi-
ately notified and vigorous
search made for the daring
robber, but up to late reports
he has not been caught.

RIVERBOATS UP IN FLAMES

Hundreds of people stood
on the banks of the Yukon
River yesterday morning
and cried as the riverboats
CASCA and WHITE-
HORSE were engulfed by
flames.

The two grand old ladies
of the White Pass and
Yukon Route fleet caught
fire at approximately 10
a.m. and were reduced to
two large heaps of ashes
less than two hours later.
The dry wooden ships
burned like tinder, with
flames rising more than
100 feet in the air within
minutes and giving off an
intense heat.

Fire officials still have
found no cause of the fire,
and say that investigations
are continuing. Firemen
were still hosing down the
red-hot coals late yester-
day, and no inspection
was expected for at least
24 hours, according to
Yukon fire marshal Tom
Nairn.

Shortly after the fire call
went out, police helped
three young people off the
CASCA. The trio, in their
early twenties and from
Ontario, had been living on

the boat for a week. They
were taken in to custody
and questioned by police
until late Thursday after-
noon before being re-
leased. No charges were
laid and police, along with
fire officials, are seeking
another explanation for the
fire.

The blaze began on the
CASCA, spreading rapidly
to the WHITEHORSE, less
than 10 feet away, and
threatened to engulf a
storage shed owned by
White Pass as well. Fire-
men, after overcoming ini-
tial difficulties with a lack of
water, managed to douse
the fire from going beyond the
bounds of the riverboats.
The pair of stately old
steamboats were two of
five left from a fleet that
plied the rivers of the
Yukon during the first half
of this century. The
WHITEHORSE, built in
1901, was the acknowl-
edged Queen of that fleet.
Ironically, she was built on
the very spot that she fi-
nally died on yesterday.

The three remaining
members of the White

Pass fleet are the
KLONDIKE, situated in
town just up the river from
the two that burned yester-
day; the TUTSHI, settled
in Carcross; and the
KENO, now a national his-
toric site at Dawson.

Within minutes of the fire
alarm, hundreds of people
had gathered at the final
resting place of the two old
sternwheelers. Dozens of
old-timers who were here
when the boats were actu-
ally in operation recalled
memories to quiet by-
standers.

Roy Minter, an employee
of White Pass who had
long lobbied for the preser-
vation and restoration of
the neglected boats, was
at the scene too, looking
slouch-shouldered and
defeated.

"...I've always thought of
Dawson as the center of
the Gold Rush" he said
sadly, "and of Whitehorse
as the center of trans-
portation during those
days. These boats were
such an integral part of all
that. Today they're gone
and the Yukon just lost a
little of its soul."
