A CONSIGNMENT OF HOCKEY JUNK

It's not often a local hockey team has a chance to vie for the Stanley Cup, but it happened one time in Yukon history and the results of the contest make it probable that it will never happen again.

Hockey was big in the Klondike in 1904, and the competition so fierce that local promoters of the sport were looking for bigger and greater challenges. With the typical Yukon "if you're going to go for it, you might as well go for the top" attitude, Dawson organizers wrote to Ottawa challenging the World Champions to a Stanley Cup duel. The challenge was accepted.

The Klondike team sallied forth from Dawson to do battle with the Ottawa Invincibles, also known as "The Silver Seven."

Ottawa Hockey Team Won First Game of Series by Score of 9-2. The Dawson Hockey team went down in overwhelming defeat before the Ottawa Invincibles by a score of 23-2 in the second.

Death of the Rail

A distressing accident occurred on the
W.P. & Y. Route yesterday at 11:55 a.m.
about two miles south of Frazer station.
Two passengers on the last up trip of the
Dolphin, after reaching Skagway, decided
to walk over the mountain and had reached
the point above named when they were
overtaken by the north bound train running
at a speed of 25 miles an hour.

At the place where the accident happened
the snow is piled up on each side of the
track to a height of five or six feet, with
barely room for the passage of the body of
the cars.

One of the men was on top of the snow
bank, but the other a German named
Hauser, about 35 years of age, six feet tall,
weight about 180 pounds, light complexion
and light mustache, was on the track. The
man on the bank heard the roar of the train
and called to his companion, who endeav-
ored to scale the wall of snow; but he was
too late and was caught by the snow plow,

thrown under the wheels and frightfully
mangled before the train could be brought
to a stop. As soon as possible the train crew
took the man from underneath the wheels
and placed him on board the train, but he
expired a very few minutes afterward.

On examination it was found that his arms
and legs were ground almost to a pulp and
that a portion of his skull had been torn
away. The body was brought as far as Ben-
nett and there left to await an inquest.

No blame is attached to the employees of
the railroad, as at the time of the accident
the train had just rounded a sharp curve and
the plow was throwing such a quantity of
snow that it was impossible to see anything
in front.

It is said the deceased was a resident of
Chelan Falls, State of Washington, and
leaves a wife and four children.

THE MAD TRAPPER
OF RAT RIVER

The place is Aklavik, a tiny village in the Mackenzie River Delta in the northwest corner of Canada’s Northwest Territories and the man called himself Albert Johnson. He was dubbed “the mad trapper of Rat River” and was the fugitive in the most bizarre and dramatic manhunt in Canada’s history.

To this day, little light has been shed on the real identity of the strange man who was finally gunned down in the mid-winter snows in Eagle River, Yukon on February 17, 1932.

In the sparsely populated river valleys of Canada’s Arctic, this was strange and unseemly behavior where friendly and social interchange was the basic fabric of life. The cold-eyed stranger’s surly silence in this already silent and lonely land made people uneasy.

A Mountie was obliged to question Johnson as a result of a formal complaint lodged against him by two Loucheux trappers. It was ascertained that Johnson refused to acknowledge or say a single word when the Mountie visited his lonely cabin on Rat River.

When the same officer returned with a search warrant several days later, Johnson, still without saying a word, shot and seriously wounded the constable.

On the third occasion, a heavily armed posse laid siege to his cabin for three days. They even used dynamite to blow the roof off and dislodge the trapper from his cabin but to no avail. He fired round for round and for the third time forced his attackers to retire for further supplies and to plan a subsequent assault.

Radio reports of the confrontation between the taciturn trapper and the famed mounted police force of Canada’s Arctic had reached the outside world and had fired up the interest of North Americans. It has been stated that the daily reports of the chase and periodic shoot-outs hastened the public acceptance of radio as a medium for blow-by-blow news coverage.

When a larger and better equipped posse was again ready to confront Johnson, it was learned he had abandoned his damaged cabin at Rat River. He had disappeared on foot into the frigid white world of the vast Mackenzie River Valley.

The wilderness trained Mounties, the Loucheux and white trappers live by sight, sound and a sixth sense, they interpret what they see and hear. Even the seemingly indefatigable and super-elusive Albert Johnson must leave tracks in the winter snows. A week passed before the Mounties found a faint trace of the trapper’s trail and resumed pursuit.

He was found, a gun battle ensued and a Mountie was shot dead by Johnson. He then scaled an ice covered canyon wall and disappeared once more into the twilight of the Arctic wilderness.

It was around this time that the famed pioneer bush pilot, Wop May, joined the manhunt with his ski equipped aircraft. The aircraft not only ferried supplies to the pursuit parties, but was instrumental in spotting the fugitive’s trail from the air.

Johnson, meanwhile, had somehow managed to cross the forbidding Richardson Mountain Range using a caribou herd and a blizzard to obliterate his trail. It was a fantastic feat for a man travelling alone and on foot and the crowning proof of the man’s amazing stamina and endurance.

In spite of the odds against him, it was almost by accident that he was encountered, surrounded and eventually shot to death on the Eagle River, 40 days after the initial confrontation on the Rat River. Defiant to the last, he seriously wounded yet another Mountie before he died.

Although called upon to surrender a score of times by the law officers, Johnson was never heard to utter a single word during the almost seven weeks of siege, pursuit and battle. Who was he really? ...and where did he come from?

He was a silent man, in a lonely land.

The rifles and snowshoes of the “mad trapper of Rat River” remain on display at the RCMP Museum in Regina, Saskatchewan.

1902 News from the Whitehorse Star

- Has Gone to the Outside -

Ed La Belle, Peter Fournier’s Partner,
Left Dawson July 22nd

His Name Appeared in the Printed Passenger Lists -- Fournier
Arraigned and Remanded for Seven Days -- Did Not Plead.

Dawson, Aug. 30 - It has been ascertained that Ed La Belle, the partner of Peter Fournier, who is now under arrest here suspected of being implicated in the murder of three men near Ogilvie the middle of last June, left for the outside on July 22nd as a first-class passenger on the steamer Columbian and though there hangs over his head a suspicion of having abetted in the commission of two or three murders, he traveled under his real name and made no secrecy of his having departed. His name, with the other passengers, was printed in the local papers at the time, and the list is now on file at the police station and at the White Pass office.

Fournier was arraigned on the 23rd inst. in the police court on the charge of murder in the first degree, in having killed Leon Boutillette. He did not plead, but was remanded for seven days, when he will enter a plea.

It is now stated that the report published that \$400 was found on the person of Fournier, is erroneous, and that he had no money when arrested.

The police have received the photographs of three of the five men who left Whitehorse together on the trip down river. They are Leon Boutillette, Alphonso Constantin and Beaudoin.

The body of the former was found near Indian River, and from a tag on a key chain was the name which led to the identification of the remains. The body contained three gunshot wounds which told that he was

shot from behind, and as he turned to see his assailants was shot twice through the head.

The body of Beaudoin was found with a rope on one arm and one on an ankle with slip knots and loops on the ends, which convince the police that the man was murdered and then weighted with stones which dropped off by the continual jolting over the gravel bottom of the river. His head was crushed and there could be no doubt that he also was murdered.

Alphonso Contantin, not showing up in Dawson, can be set down as being the third victim. He came to this country in ‘98 and became interested on Last Chance.

Beaudoin was a native of Beauce county, Quebec, and had just graduated from college when he concluded to come to the Klondike probably on the representations of Constantin. He was 23 years of age and a bright young man, with the physique of one who is not satisfied with the humdrum life of the east.

The three left Montreal June 4 and reached Whitehorse June 12. June 16 they started in a small boat in company with two other men, who joined the party at Whitehorse.

The body of Boutillette was found on July 16, and that of Beaudoin on August 1. The remains of a man found near Selkirk so badly decomposed that the body was hardly to be recognized, may be the third man of the latest river mystery.

The inaugural game was played on Saturday, November 24, 1906 between the "B.Y.N." and "Police A" teams. The win went to "Police A" with the score board showing 20-13.

While the STAR dutifully announced each up-coming game and faithfully published all results; we never did state the actual rules. From reading through the write-ups we know they played in a "large hall" at the North Star Athletic Association. Somehow, the walls of the hall were incorporated as part of the "field". As we see in the picture here, they used a narrow baton-like bat and a rather large ball. The public was always "cordially invited" and there were "seats for ladies in the balcony."

The sport was so popular, games were scheduled each Monday, Wednesday and Saturday evening. (And in 1906 that schedule included games played on Christmas Eve and Boxing Day too - now that's dedication!)
