YUKON'S GREAT SHOWING

Yukon Territory's contribution to the Empire and Allied cause in this war is nothing short of magnificent.

Despite the fact the region is remote and the people are engaged in struggling against primitive and exceptionally obdurate and severe conditions in pioneering, they have more than held their own in the war game.

Between four and five hundred men have gone from this territory direct to the war, meaning practically ten per cent of the population of Yukon are under arms in Europe. Were the whole of the Dominion, with its eight million people, to contribute in like proportion to Yukon there would be 800,000 men, or just twice as many enlisted from Canada today as there are. ...

The generous and patriotic spirit of Yukon deserves to be known throughout the Empire and Allied realm. If all the Empire were contributing in like proportion in men and money the assembled wealth and armies today would be far greater than they are. But these matters will adjust themselves.

Yukoners will continue to do a mighty share and uphold the tradition that the sons and daughters of the North are excelled by none in loyalty to the nation and to humanity.

**CITY RESIDENT MAKES
POLAR HISTORY**

Whitehorse resident Martyn Williams has become the first Canadian to reach both poles of the earth using only skis and a small dog team.

Williams, 44 and his three companions on the International north Pole Expedition were picked up Saturday after six grueling weeks of fighting severe temperatures, driving winds, and tough, unpredictable sea ice.

All four members of the group are South Pole veterans. Australian Mike McDowell 44, accompanied Williams to the South Pole in 1990. Norwegian brothers Sjur, 27, and Simen Modre, 29, traveled to the South Pole in 1991.

The group is now resting at the advance base on Ellesmere Island before they return tonight to Resolute Bay, N.W.T.

Tough terrain slowed progress for the first few weeks. However, the expedition traveled more than 25 kilometres a day in the last couple of weeks to make up for last time.

They had to reach the pole by May 12. After that date, warming temperatures cause fog and broken ice, which makes air pick-up impossible.

The trip has been much tougher than expected, Pangman said. Temperatures have averaged about -35° and driving winds have caused frostbite. A team of eight dogs has been more of a hindrance than a help. Pangman said.

FIRST AIRCRAFT

Whitehorse Paved the Way for Aviation in the North.

For a history of aviation in the Yukon Territory we have to go back to June, 1920, when Capt. H.T. Douglas of the U.S. Air Force and Capt. H.A. Leroyer of the Canadian Air Board arrived in Whitehorse to talk over a proposed international aeroplane flight from Mineola, N.Y. to Nome Alaska. They both came with the authority of their respective governments to make all necessary arrangements for landing places, fuel, supplies, etc. In commenting on the proposed flight the Whitehorse STAR of that day described it as "an event that will go down in history as one of the most daring conceptions of the potentialities of aerial flight that has ever been conceived since the possibilities of a lighter-than-air craft as a means of transportation became, through the inventive genius of man, a certainty."

Death of the Rail

A distressing accident occurred on the W.P. & Y. Route yesterday at 11:55 a.m. about two miles south of Frazer station. Two passengers on the last up trip of the Dolphin, after reaching Skagway, decided to walk over the mountain and had reached the point above named when they were overtaken by the north bound train running at a speed of 25 miles an hour.

At the place where the accident happened the snow is piled up on each side of the track to a height of five or six feet, with barely room for the passage of the body of the cars.

One of the men was on top of the snow bank, but the other a German named Hauser, about 35 years of age, six feet tall, weight about 180 pounds, light complexion and light mustache, was on the track. The man on the bank heard the roar of the train and called to his companion, who endeavored to scale the wall of snow; but he was too late and was caught by the snow plow,

thrown under the wheels and frightfully mangled before the train could be brought to a stop. As soon as possible the train crew took the man from underneath the wheels and placed him on board the train, but he expired a very few minutes afterward.

On examination it was found that his arms and legs were ground almost to a pulp and that a portion of his skull had been torn away. The body was brought as far as Bennett and there left to await an inquest.

No blame is attached to the employees of the railroad, as at the time of the accident the train had just rounded a sharp curve and the plow was throwing such a quantity of snow that it was impossible to see anything in front.

It is said the deceased was a resident of Chelan Falls, State of Washington, and leaves a wife and four children.

Hundreds of people stood on the banks of the Yukon River yesterday morning and cried as the riverboats CASCA and WHITEHORSE were engulfed by flames.

The two grand old ladies of the White Pass and Yukon Route fleet caught fire at approximately 10 a.m. and were reduced to two large heaps of ashes less than two hours later. The dry wooden ships burned like tinder, with flames rising more than 100 feet in the air within minutes and giving off an intense heat.

Fire officials still have found no cause of the fire, and say that investigations are continuing. Firemen were still hosing down the red-hot coals late yesterday, and no inspection was expected for at least 24 hours, according to Yukon fire marshal Tom Nairn.

Shortly after the fire call went out, police helped three young people off the CASCA. The trio, in their early twenties and from Ontario, had been living on

the boat for a week. They were taken in to custody and questioned by police until late Thursday afternoon before being released. No charges were laid and police, along with fire officials, are seeking another explanation for the fire.

The blaze began on the CASCA, spreading rapidly to the WHITEHORSE, less than 10 feet away, and threatened to engulf a storage shed owned by White Pass as well. Firemen, after overcoming initial difficulties with a lack of water, managed to douse the shed and prevent the fire from going beyond the bounds of the riverboats. The pair of stately old steamboats were two of five left from a fleet that plied the rivers of the Yukon during the first half of this century. The WHITEHORSE, built in 1901, was the acknowledged Queen of that fleet. Ironically, she was built on the very spot that she finally died on yesterday.

The three remaining members of the White

Pass fleet are the KLONDIKE, situated in town just up the river from the two that burned yesterday; the TUTSHI, settled in Carcross; and the KENO, now a national historic site at Dawson.

Within minutes of the fire alarm, hundreds of people had gathered at the final resting place of the two old sternwheelers. Dozens of old-timers who were here when the boats were actually in operation recalled memories to quiet bystanders.

Roy Minter, an employee of White Pass who had long lobbied for the preservation and restoration of the neglected boats, was at the scene too, looking slouch-shouldered and defeated.

"...I've always thought of Dawson as the center of the Gold Rush" he said sadly, "and of Whitehorse as the center of transportation during those days. These boats were such an integral part of all that. Today they're gone and the Yukon just lost a little of its soul."

A Night's Stampede

Monday's stage from Dawson brought to White Horse the first news of a rich find of gold on a small creek below Selwin and about seven miles this side of Island Point roadhouse and running into the Yukon from the west bank.

The creek was prospected late last fall by a Frenchman named Mascot, and instead of recording the location at once the prospector waited until he received from below an assay of the ore secured, and this only reached him about ten days ago. Mascot at once staked his claim and a week ago Monday went to Selkirk to have it recorded. The telegraph office at Selkirk is not far from the office of record and – nobody knows how it happened – in some way the people at Selwin were advised of the discovery almost as soon as the claim was placed on record.

There was a rush of gold seekers inaugurated not only from Selwin but from Renton roadhouse and other points along the trail, and

before daylight on Tuesday the entire creek had been staked. One of the drivers for the C.D.Co., was one of the first to hear of the new find and at midnight Monday, after mushing from Renton, staked one of the first claims above Mascot's discovery. By daylight Tuesday 29 claims were staked and as soon thereafter as possible were placed upon record at Selkirk. Mascot had intended to tip the find off to a coterie of his friends as soon as he had recorded his own claim and was much surprised when he returned to the creek and found it looking like a thriving mining camp with two dozen tents put up at intervals along the gulch. Mascot has given out that the gold secured is very rich, going strong at \$18 to the ounce, but has nothing to say as to how much to the pan he secured. He has not as yet reached bedrock, but is well satisfied that he has struck a rich placer claim. The creek has been named Mascot after the discoverer.
