WIDOW ESCAPES AS FIRE GUTS ARLINGTON

A chance visit by Jim Toohey on his way from his home at Sulphur to Dawson probably saved the life of Mrs. Harry McDonnell Wednesday night when the Arlington Roadhouse burned to the ground. The Arlington is a Dawson landmark 10 miles from town, famous for years for its hospitality.

Toohey had dropped in to see the pioneer widow shortly before she noticed sparks dropping into the living room from the stovepipe safety. The pair rushed upstairs to find the top floor ablaze. Flames shot fiercely through the tinder dry building so quickly Mrs. McDonnell had time only to grab a few dresses and blankets. The fire truck and many volunteers sped to the scene through sixty-below weather from Bear Creek but the old-time roadhouse burned to the ground.

The McDonnell's were Gold Rush pioneers and the Arlington known to hundreds of Yukoners, was built during the Gold Rush days.

Space All Contracted

During the past few days the traffic department of the White Pass & Yukon Route has contracted in advance for all the cold storage space on its rail and steamer lines from Skagway to Dawson for the entire season.

The contracts held amount in the aggregate to 1000 tons of freight. This will be chiefly fruits, fresh eggs, poultry, fresh meats, and vegetables.

This is an entirely new business in Alaska transportation annals. The construction of

three new steamers on the upper Yukon by the White Pass company, equipped with cold storage apparatus, was the last step taken in the matter of arranging or cold storage shipments this year by the traffic department.

The steamers equipped in this manner are the Ogilvie, McConnell and Dawson. Each will have a capacity of 20 tons. Skagway News.

A CONSIGNMENT OF HOCKEY JUNK

It's not often a local hockey team has a chance to vie for the Stanley Cup, but it happened one time in Yukon history and the results of the contest make it probable that it will never happen again.

Hockey was big in the Klondike in 1904, and the competition so fierce that local promoters of the sport were looking for bigger and greater challenges. With the typical Yukon "if you're going to go for it, you might as well go for the top" attitude, Dawson organizers wrote to Ottawa challenging the World Champions to a Stanley Cup duel. The challenge was accepted.

The Klondike team sallied forth from Dawson to do battle with the Ottawa Invincibles, also known as "The Silver Seven."

Ottawa Hockey Team Won First Game of Series by Score of 9-2. The Dawson Hockey team went down in overwhelming defeat before the Ottawa Invincibles by a score of 23-2 in the second.

BABE SOUTHWICK: YUKON SPIRIT

In February, 1965, a well-known Yukoner, Babe Southwick, burst into Whitehorse with her Destruction Bay dog team to enter the Sourdough Rendezvous dog races. A beautiful, boisterous, 40-year-old woman wearing a parka and mukluks, she added colorful joviality to the festivities.

Babe Southwick was one of the pioneer Dickson clan which lived along the shores of Kluane Lake long before the Alaska Highway pushed its way past their doors. Her father Tom came to the Yukon as a mountie during the Klondike Gold rush, married her mother Louise, then left the force to go trapping and raise a family. He was one of the Yukon's first big game outfitters.

That night at the Yukon Dog Musher's Association meeting Babe drew the number eight starting position. Friday morning, the first day of the three days of racing, her well trained team disappeared in a cloud of whirling snow, making good time on the 14.3-mile trail. Running just over an hour, the Southwick team finished the first day's race in the top five. As usual she took care of her dogs after the race, then walked with her sister, Belle, to her hotel where Babe retired from activities.

Two hours later she was rushed to Whitehorse General Hospital where she was pronounced dead. The doctor said it was a heart attack, but none of the family knew she had such a condition, and they didn't know whether Babe herself knew.

SILENT TRIBUTE

The news spread rapidly through Whitehorse and a pall hung over the Rendezvous festivities but it was decided to carry on.

Speaking to the crowd of several thousand gathered along the bank of the Yukon River, J.B. Fitzgerald, Game Director for Yukon, said in part: "... Babe was a real Yukoner and a member of the highly respected Dickson family. She was an experienced musher and competed successfully in a good number of sled dog races. She was vice-president of the Yukon Dog Musher's Association and contributed very much to it and was highly respected by all members of the organization.

"She leaves behind a great host of friends...Ladies and gentlemen, we will now observe one minute's silence in memory of Babe..."

Ten dog drivers lined up at the starting gate, each with an arm band of black. With bowed heads and tear stained faces they stood through the silence observed by the crowd as the Southwick team sat silently in their harness nearby. Babe's racing number, 8, was then withdrawn.

In the crowd watching the races that year and meeting Yukoners for the first time, was the editor of The Edmonton JOURNAL, Andrew Snaddon and his wife Jocelyn. They were impressed with the Yukon Sourdough Rendezvous and the welcome they'd received from Yukoners. Profoundly moved by Babe's death, and desiring to do something, the Snaddons convinced the Journal (despite the newspapers policy of not giving trophies) to donate the BABE SOUTHWICK MEMORIAL TROPHY. Inspired by "Mrs. Southwick's great spirit and high reputation" it was to be awarded to the team with the fastest lap of the three heats. Although no prize money is attached to the winning of the Babe Southwick trophy, it remains the award most dog drivers desire.

Babe Southwick personified the spirit and intent of the original Rendezvous. It was a gathering of friends and relatives after a long cold winter. It was a time for stories to be swapped and old acquaintances re-affirmed. These were not professional racers, just tough, hardy Yukoner's with working teams. They were in town for a good time, and racing for the sheer fun of it.

When Babe died that first day of Rendezvous, Friday, February 26, 1965, one minute of silence the next day gave time for remembrance. Now, 35 years later the Babe Southwick Memorial Trophy allows us to remember a true Yukon spirit. And that's why there's no number 8 in the Yukon Sourdough Rendezvous dog races.

1899 News from The Bennett Sun
Can't Count His Money

Such Is the Sad Condition in Which Alexander McDonald Finds Himself

Alexander McDonald, king of the Klondike, not only is not insolvent but has so much money it is almost a hopeless task to compute it. Such is the report brought out by a shrewd business man who left McDonald about fifteen days ago, and is a partner with him in his many enterprises. "The report is not only absurd but is malicious," said this gentleman.

Mr. McDonald went in to Dawson in March and his business affairs were never in better shape. Since then he has purchased five claims on Sulphur Creek at from \$30,000 to \$50,000 each.

He owns a whole or a fractional interest in 79 claims on Sulphur, Bonanza, Eldorado and Dominion creeks, and there isn't one wildcat among them. Every single claim is turning out a profit daily - and instead of borrowing money Mr. McDonald is loaning it. Rates used to be at 10 per cent per month, but any one with good security can get all the money he wants of McDonald at 2 and 3 per cent a month.

The so called story of McDonald's insolvency had not reached Dawson when this gentleman left, and when it does reach there, there will be a great laugh. The idea of a man being broke who does not owe a dollar and whose clean-up for the winter work amounted to \$1,250,000 is something decided-

ly funny. Since he went to Dawson in March McDonald has paid \$100,000 in royalties to the Canadian government, and besides his daily deeds of charity has made a donation of \$30,000 cash to the Catholic church and hospital.

His income is continuous and he does not have to wait for the result of a winter's work in a spring cleanup. Some of his best paying claims are summer diggings and his pack train of mules comes into Dawson regularly once a week loaded down with gold.

The facts are McDonald is so wealthy it is impossible for him or any one else to make a close computation of his holdings. Besides his gold he has large improved holdings in real estate that bring in a splendid income. The person who started the story of his insolvency simply did so to try to injure the credit of one of the richest, best, most generous and highly respected men in all Alaska.

Mr. McDonald's friends in Juneau do not need these assurances, but they are none the less gratifying- Juneau Miner. — *The Bennett Sun, September 2, 1899*

The inaugural game was played on Saturday, November 24, 1906 between the "B.Y.N." and "Police A" teams. The win went to "Police A" with the score board showing 20-13.
While the STAR dutifully announced each up-coming game and faithfully published all results; we never did state the actual rules. From reading through the write-ups we know they played in a "large hall" at the North Star Athletic Association. Somehow, the walls of the hall were incorporated as part of the "field". As we see in the picture here, they used a narrow baton-like bat and a rather large ball. The public was always "cordially invited" and there were "seats for ladies in the balcony."
The sport was so popular, games were scheduled each Monday, Wednesday and Saturday evening. (And in 1906 that schedule included games played on Christmas Eve and Boxing Day too - now that's dedication!)
