## DAWSON CRIMINAL RE-CAPTURED AFTER A YEAR'S HUNT

SWAN HARRISON, AN INSANE PATIENT ARRESTED IN THE NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

/wan Harrison, who escaped from the Northwest Mounted police at Selkirk on the Yukon a year ago, has just been captured by members of the same efficient force at a point thousands of miles distant. Harrison has been taken a prisoner in the Northwest territories.

A telegram has been received by Major Wood at Dawson telling him of the capture of Harrison.

When Harrison escaped at Selkirk he was being taken out of the Yukon to New Westminister, B.C. as an insane patient. He had been arrested and convicted at Dawson some time before for stealing, had become insane while in prison and was transferred to the lunatic ward.

While the steamer was lying at Selkirk Harrison made a leap from the boat, and landing partly in the water walked ashore, scrambled away up the bank and ran into the woods before he could be overtaken. He and a number of other lunatics were in charge of Corpl. Stewart on the trip up the river. A short search was made for Harrison, but he could not be found, and the boat proceeded with the remainder of the party.

From traces obtained it is believed he went down the Yukon river and escaped by way of St. Michael or Nome. He is said to be from the States, but how it is that he should wander over into the Northwest Territories is scarcely understood. It was thought at first from the point at which the fellow turned up he must have taken a chance at the famous Edmonton trail and gotten through, but the idea is scarcely credited.

#### THE DISCOVERY WELL:

Little was it thought when the original "Discovery Well' was drilled in 1928 in the Fort Norman area that, through the exigencies of war, the oil that flowed from there would be piped to Whitehorse, a distance of 595 miles, and refined here The transportation of men and equipment over a road more than a thousand miles long was one of the major obstacles encountered and overcome. Camps, warehouses and platforms were constructed and pre-fabricated, barges, tugs assembled and Camp Canol was established.

In June 1942 the U.S. Engineer troops arrived in Waterways, a small frontier town northeast of Edmonton, and the men of the navigation system in Norman Wells on the Mackenzie River. By the summer of 1943 the water system had been well established, in the meantime another route from Dawson Creek, B.C. to Whitehorse on the Alaska Highway had been opened. This pioneer road was completed in November 1942 and converted into an all-weather military highway by October

As the transportation systems came into operation crews started from Whitehorse and Norman Wells to construct the Canol access road at both ends. This road was completed in December 31, 1943 and in the following February (1944) the first weld was made in the 595-mile pipeline. On April 30, 1944 the official opening of the refinery was fittingly commemorated.

1969 News From the Whitehorse Star Court Told:

## 'Blood Gushed Like Water'

Murder Suspect Committed For Trial

Zoltan Macko was committed for trial Friday, at the conclusion of a preliminary hearing into a charge of non capital murder. The 30 year old miner from Hungary has been charged in connection with the shooting death of Mehmed Dupobac, also 30, at Arctic Gold and Silver Mine near Carcross on December 10 last year.

During the two day hearing the court heard a large number of crown witnesses, miners, tell that an all night drinking party had been going on in room eight of the bunkhouse, occupied by Jordan Kalajdjiev and Frank Kuster. The two roommates were present, as were Dupobac and others. Later the group was joined by the accused Macko, known to his acquaintances as "Zorro".

Witness testified that some time before six a.m. there was an argument and a scuffle between Kalajdjiev, known as "Blackie" and Macko, who eventually left and returned to his own room down the hall.

Shortly afterwards he was seen outside Kalajdjiev's room and two shots were heard.

The court learned that in the corridor Zorro allegedly was calling Blackie to come outside, and accused him of kicking him (Zorro) in the face during the fight.

Kalajdjiev, a dark-haired 26 year old Yugoslav, testified that he tried to keep the door shut but that Mehmed Dupobac known as "Mayo" went out in the hall to act as peacemaker.

Witnesses said that a discussion followed, a third shot was fired, and Dupobac fell to the floor with a shotgun blast in his chest.

Walter Parsons of room six next door told how he overheard both the fight in the room and the shooting. He said that during the party he heard Zorro's voice say "help, help, don't do that." And someone else in room eight say "Don't Jordan, that's enough." There was mostly talk, and then later three shots.

## LIKE A GUSH OF WATER

"After the third shot I heard a sound like a gush of water," said Parsons, "and blood came under the door of my room and up the sides of the closet."

Other testimony revealed how the First Aid man, William Evans was summoned but could do nothing for the deceased. Evans said he took a gun away from Zorro.

The preliminary hearing was conducted before Magistrate John Varcoe, with D.S. Collins appearing for the crown and H.H. Regehr for the defence. It was not immediately known when the case would go to trial.

## THE WHITE DEATH

f all the natural phenomena peculiar to the Rocky mountain region none is more strange, or terrible than the mysterious storm known to the Indians as "the white death". Scientific men have never yet had an opportunity of investigating it, because it comes at the most unexpected times and may keep away from a certain locality for years. Well-read men who have been through it say that it is really a frozen fog. But where the fog comes from is more than anyone can say. This phenomenon occurs most frequently in the northern part of Colorado, in Wyoming, and occasionally in Montana.

About two years ago a party of three women and two men were crossing North Park in a wagon in the month of February. The air was bitterly cold, but dry as a bone and motionless. The sun shone with almost startling brilliancy. As the five people drove along over the crisp snow they did not experience the least cold, but really felt most comfortable, and rather enjoyed the trip. Mountain peaks fifty miles away could be seen as distinctly as the pine trees beside the roadside.

Suddenly one of the women put her hand up to her face and remarked that something had stung her. Then other members of the party did the same thing, although not a sign of an insect could be seen. All marveled greatly at this. A moment later they noticed that the distant mountains were disappearing behind a cloud of mist. Mist in Colorado in February? Surely there must be some mistake. But there was no mistake, because within ten minutes a gentle wind began to blow and the air became filled with fine particles of something that scintillated like diamond dust in the sunshine. Still the people drove on until they came to a cabin where a man signaled them to stop. With his head tied up in a bundle of mufflers, he rushed out and handed the driver a piece of paper on which was written: 'Come into the house quick, or this storm will kill all of you. Don't talk outside here."

Of course no time was lost in getting under cover and putting the horses in the stable. But they were a little too late, for in less than an hour the whole party was sick with violent coughs and fever. Before the next morning one of the women died with all the symptoms of pneumonia. The others were violently ill of it, but managed to pull through after long sickness. - Aisle's Magazine
