The "Short Man" Captured

Dawson, Feb. 28 – Wm. Brophy, the "short man" in the Dominion gambling house holdup which occurred here last fall, and for whom a reward of \$500 was offered, was captured last midnight at a roadhouse eight miles from Dawson on Bonanza Creek by four N.W.M.P.

He carried a rifle, but had no chance to use it as the police jumped on him from behind. In the scuffle that ensued Brophy was shot, but not dangerously. He was brought to Dawson and placed in jail this morning. All three men connected with the robbery (Tomelin, Harris, and Brophy) are now in custody.

Brophy held up a man on Bonanza four nights ago, robbing him of four ounces of gold dust, and it was from a description of the robber, given by the victim, that Brophy's whereabouts became known.

CITY RESIDENT MAKES POLAR HISTORY



Whitehorse resident Martyn Williams has become the first Canadian to reach both poles of the earth using only skis and a small dog team.

Williams, 44 and his three companions on the International north Pole Expedition were picked up Saturday after six grueling weeks of fighting severe temperatures, driving winds, and tough, unpredictable sea ice.

All four members of the group are South Pole veterans. Australian Mike McDowell 44, accompanied Williams to the South Pole in 1990. Norwegian brothers Sju, 27, and Simen Modre, 29, traveled to the South Pole in 1991.

The group is now resting at the advance base on Ellesmere Island before they return tonight to Resolute Bay, N.W.T.

Tough terrain slowed progress for the first few weeks. However, the expedition traveled more than 25 kilometres a day in the last couple of weeks to make up for last time.

They had to reach the pole by May 12. After that date, warming temperatures cause fog and broken ice, which makes air pick-up impossible.

The trip has been much tougher than expected, Pangman said. Temperatures have averaged about -35° and driving winds have caused frostbite. A team of eight dogs has been more of a hindrance than a help. Pangman said.

MARTHA BENJAMIN: CANADIAN CHAMP

"Martha beats them all" a STAR headline proclaimed in 1963 when an Old Crow skier and mother of five children became the first Yukoner to win a national skiing title.

Twenty-five year old Martha Benjamin won the senior women's cross country skiing title at the Canadian championships in Midland, Ontario. Her time over the 10 kilometre race was 43.29 minutes. And in 1989, 26 years after that historic event, Benjamin was inducted in the Yukon Sports Hall of Fame. "After all these years, I didn't expect to receive something like this," she said. "I just had it in me that I wanted to do it, and I did it," she said of her win in Midland Ontario.

Benjamin and Ben Charlie were the only two skiers to attend the championships. Charlie ranked 11th in a field of 48. His toughest competition came from a group of Finns from Sudbury who swept the field.

Both skiers brought high credit and distinction (not to mention the publicity) to their community and to the Yukon as a whole. Star correspondent Edith Josie wrote before they left: "I had wire from Mr. Harry at Whitehorse. He said Ben Charlie and Mrs. Martha Benjamin will go to Ottawa for International Olympic Competition for skiers on February 13. Frank Cook will take them out. Everyone is very glad to hear these two will go out long travel. Hope they had good trip. Old Crow is little town and Father Mouchet is training boys and girls for the skiers. Now they even go way out to Ottawa. Sure big surprise for the people in Old Crow."

Mouchet, an experienced ski instructor for the French army, designed a training program which is now called TEST (Territorial Experimental Ski Training). This program strives to stimulate and motivate children to discover themselves, develop self-reliance through a rigorous training schedule and gain self-confidence through a series of tough, but surmountable challenges.

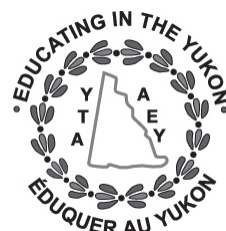

MOOSE CALF
'ADOPTS' MAN
AS ITS MOTHER

Curt Mintz huddled in the bush with
his two dogs for 20 minutes wait-
ing for the cow moose to attack.

"There's no way you can come be-
tween a cow and a calf and live," Mintz
said in an interview Monday. "I'd rather
meet a grizzly."

But there was no attack.

Instead, Mintz became the adopted
mother to a three-day-old female moose
calf that now lives at the Yukon Game
Farm on the Takhini Hot Springs Road.

Mintz came upon the moose on June 2
while strolling through the woods about
four kilometres from his cabin on the
Alaska Highway near Whitehorse.

"I heard it first, and I thought it was a
bear, so I just dived down and grabbed the
two dogs and held them.

"I knew whatever it was didn't hear
me, 'cause it was making too much noise.

"When I saw it was calf sitting there,
I was more worried. I thought, 'I came
between a cow and a calf, I'm in really
big trouble.' I stayed down there for about
20 minutes.

"I circled around the thing and saw it
was a calf moose. So then I snuck up on it
and within 10 feet, it heard me. It started
crying just like a little baby."

That's when he realized it was alone.

The calf was probably a twin and left
behind by its mother, Mintz said. If the
mother had been shot, he said, the calf
would have stayed with the mother and
the hunters would have gotten it.

"It wouldn't have lasted overnight.
There's no doubt about it. It's like Grand
Central Station out there for coyotes."

He stroked the calf, grabbed it, put it
on his shoulders and marched four kilo-
metres back to his cabin with it.

"After about maybe an hour or two, it
figured I was its mother. If I walked away
from it, it would start crying."

The calf wasn't afraid of people, he
said. It liked his dogs, his friend's cat, and
gave his guests big moose-lip kisses.

It would cry to eat, lay down, and go
outside because it wanted Mintz to be
closer to it.

It was three days old, so it couldn't
follow him far. It would walk for a while,
then stop and cry when Mintz continued.

"I entertained thoughts at one point in
time of keeping it," Mintz said. But he de-
cided it would be better for the moose if it
went to the game farm. Danny Nowlan,
owner of the Yukon Game Farm, is an old
friend of Mintz's father.

Nowlan has had a bull moose for about
10 years, said Mintz, and he hasn't be able
to find a cow.

So, this could be the beginning of a Yu-
kon moose family bred in captivity.

Yukon Territory's contribution to the Empire and Allied cause
in this war is nothing short of magnificent.

Despite the fact the region is remote and the people are en-

just twice as many enlisted from Canada today as there are. ...

The generous and patriotic spirit of Yukon deserves to be
known throughout the Empire and Allied realm. If all the Em-
pire were contributing in like proportion in men and money the
assembled wealth and armies today would be far greater than
they are. But these matters will adjust themselves.

Yukoners will continue to do a mighty share and uphold the tradition that the sons and daughters of the North
are excelled by none in loyalty to the nation and to humanity.

SUPER-ROBIN ZIPS 900 MILES IN
SEVEN-HOUR MIGRATION

Rupert the Robin's winter migration came late
- but it sure was fast.

It took Rupert only about seven hours
Friday to fly 925 miles from Whitehorse to Vancouver.
And he didn't have to move a feather.

Rupert came the easy way - on a mercy flight that
saved him from almost certain death by starvation or
freezing.

Whitehorse car dealer Bill Drury first spotted Ru-
pert Nov. 10 munching berries on the mountain ash in
front of his living room window.

As the days went by Drury and his wife grew con-
cerned that Rupert didn't fly south to join his fellow
robins who had left a month earlier.

On Thursday they decided Rupert needed some
assistance.

"It was 17 below zero, the coldest day yet, and the
winds were strong, 25 miles an hour," said Drury. "I
don't think the poor little thing would have lasted
another day."

He snared Rupert in his hat, thawed him out in the
house and fed him snow from a teaspoon and cranber-
ries impaled on broom straws.

A wildlife expert told him that the bird would have
little change of surviving the Yukon winter, so Drury
decided to arrange Rupert's migration for him.

He got co-operation from Whitehorse Star publisher
Bob Erlam and Canadian Pacific Airlines, and Rupert
was booked onto flight 22 Friday afternoon with a
supply of cranberries from Drury's deep-freeze.

"When I saw him off he was as fit as blueberry pie.
Better make that mountain ash berry pie," said Drury.

Rupert was pampered by the stewardesses on the
flight and met at Vancouver International Airport by
Bill Bell chief inspector for the SPCA.

He spent the night at Bell's home.

"He's pretty perky," Bell said today. "I got him some
mountain ash berries from a bush up the street."

He said he planned to release Rupert in Stanley Park
later on in the day.

Rupert should feel at home there.

"We have lots of mountain ash bushes," said Stanley
Park zoo curator Alan Best. "And they're loaded with
berries this year."
