## SMELTING CENTRE

Construction of the three big hydro plants in the vicinity of Kluane Chilkoot Pass and Teslin. Estimated out - 500,000,000 horsepower - makes this the largest integrated power yield in the world.

In conjunction with the hydro construction, plans call for erection of smelters and leaching plants to process ores from Frobisher holdings in the Yukon, Northwest Territories, Ontario, Quebec, Greece and southern Rhodesia. Frobisher also has properties under development in Uganda, West Africa, Venezuela, Peru, Labrador, Montana, North and South Dakota.

Details of the plan - official permission for preliminary surveys has already been given - came to light recently and followed by a month rejection of a United States bid to harness the Yukon River system, of which Lac Laberge is a part.

At that time Resource Minister Winters intimated that development of Canadian resources in the area should be left to Canadian enterprise - Frobisher is owned by the gigantic Canadian industrial empire, Ventures Corporation.

**BOBBY KENNEDY CLIMBS MT. KENNEDY**

Mountain and mountain climbing stories in The STAR have always received prominent coverage. One of the interesting climbs was made by the late U.S. Senator Robert Kennedy in March 1965 when he climbed the Canadian mountain named for his brother President John F. Kennedy.

The mountain, 145 miles north-west of Whitehorse, forms a triangle with Mount Alverstone and Mount Hubbard and until that time was the highest (13,905 ft.) unclimbed peak in the St. Elias mountains.

When the mountain was named for the late President, the National Geographic Society and the Boston Museum of Science decided to conduct a joint survey which would result in a completely detailed map. Bobby Kennedy, though he had never climbed before, joined the party at the last minute and thus the world press became very interested. Newsmen descended on the Yukon in droves but the Whitehorse Star had the first published pictures of the event.

Veteran Everest climber Jim Whitaker of Seattle led the three man party of Kennedy and Barry Prather up the last ridge where they unroped and let the Senator ascend the last 50 yards alone to be the first man on top. It was not a particularly tough climb, as climbs go, but it was a personal pilgrimage for Kennedy, who planted the Kennedy family crest, Canadian flags and National Geographic emblem on the top.

Kennedy Mountain, at the lower camps, was crawling with other members of the climb, military men and helicopters, private planes rented by the media, the ice field research people and anyone else who could scrounge a ride.

A National Film Board crew guided by Whitehorse mountaineer Monty Alford, recorded the climb and Yukoners Bob Erlam, Alex Van Bibber and Wayne MacDonald took pictures which appeared in Life, Time and The Whitehorse Star. The latter three, incidentally, were also present when Kennedy came down that night from the ascent. They fed him steak, instant mashed potatoes, ice cream and the heel of a bottle of Madeira wine which someone (probably Bob) had stashed in a pack sack.

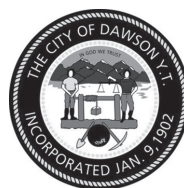
Back in Whitehorse, Kennedy dropped in to the Capital Hotel to get cleaned up and have a drink with the locals. He bought a round and paid for it with a cheque which owner Cal Miller kept and had framed. Said Cal, "I told him I wanted to keep it as a souvenir of the next President of the United States."

The hotel proper will be under the management of mesdames Lane and Taylor, who have, during the past three months, made a splendid reputation as hostesses by the first-class manner in which they have conducted the Palace Hotel of this city. The traveller who has once been a guest at the latter house will surely find his way to the Grand Palace on his return to Bennett and learns that these ladies are in charge of the place.

The bar in connection with the hotel is controlled by R.B. Alverson & Co., well known to a great majority of our citizens, and their reputation is a good guarantee that nothing but the best of goods in their line, served by the most dexterous and polite mixologists, will be offered to the patrons of this department.

With such people in all departments of the new hotel it cannot fail to become a very popular house.

**1902 News from the Whitehorse Star**
**New Kind of Hydraulic**

From the Yukon (Dawson) Sun 12th inst: Several sleigh loads of machinery are expected from the outside today, which may be the initiatory step toward the revolutionizing of the mining industry of the north. The consignment is for the N.A.T.&T. Co., and consists of an experimental plant called the Adams hydraulic lift. It will be installed at once at No. 63 below on Bonanza, under the personal supervision of J.H. Adams, its inventor.

The plant was built in San Francisco especially for the Klondike test. The plan of operation is different from the ordinary hydraulic work, and as the name implies it is in the nature of a lift, whereby gravel can be raised into a sluice box from a point many-feet below. Its principle is similar to a centrifugal pump. The apparatus contains two main pipes, one of which by gravity plays on the bed of gravel and forces it upward through another pipe into a sluice box. Mr. Adams in an interview, said:

"The introduction of the invention is merely an experiment, and much difficulty is apprehended in bringing it to a successful basis of operation. The objectionable features in the north are many.

"In the first place where we intend to experiment the lay of the ground prohibits a bedrock flume to carry away the residue from the works. Again, where

heretofore the gravity system has been employed the water must be pumped on Bonanza.

"The plants are now successfully operating in all parts of the world. I have opened up propositions in South Africa, South America, Mexico and Korea. In every case the ground has been handled economically and with great profit to the owners.

"If the results from the Bonanza efforts are all that are anticipated, an order for a number of mammoth plants will at once be given, which will be operated in various parts of the Yukon.

"The beneficial results that will, under these circumstances, accrue to the mining industry of the country cannot be estimated. Ground that is now considered absolutely worthless will pay big returns. To the owners of ground that is fairly rich it will men increased profits.

"The general production of the country would be greatly increased in the saving of many millions of dollars which now go to waste by the present system of mining.

"The N.A.T.&T. Co., realizes the vast benefits to be derived if the idea is successful, and on this basis is willing to spend considerable money and time to demonstrate the feasibility of the new invention."
