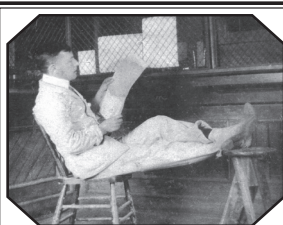

area and bagged the albino during the Yukon's open cow moose
season, along with two other cows and a light colored bull with
a horn spread of sixty-three inches.

CITY RESIDENT MAKES
POLAR HISTORY

Whitehorse resident Martyn Williams has become
the first Canadian to reach both poles of the
earth using only skis and a small dog team.

Williams, 44 and his three companions on the International
north Pole Expedition were picked up Saturday after six gruel-
ing weeks of fighting severe temperatures, driving winds, and
tough, unpredictable sea ice.

All four members of the group are South Pole veterans. Aus-
tralian Mike McDowell 44, accompanied Williams to the South
Pole in 1990. Norwegian brothers Sjur, 27, and Simen Modre,
29, traveled to the South Pole in 1991.

The group is now resting at the advance base on Ellesmere
Island before they return tonight to Resolute Bay, N.W.T.

Tough terrain slowed progress for the first few weeks. How-
ever, the expedition traveled more than 25 kilometres a day in
the last couple of weeks to make up for last time.

They had to reach the pole by May 12. After that date, warm-
ing temperatures cause fog and broken ice, which makes air
pick-up impossible.

The trip has been much tougher than expected, Pangman
said. Temperatures have averaged about -35° and driving winds
have caused frostbite. A team of eight dogs has been more of
a hindrance than a help. Pangman said.

MOOSE CALF 'ADOPTS'
MAN AS ITS MOTHER'

Curt Mintz huddled
in the bush with his
two dogs for 20 minutes
waiting for the cow moose
to attack.

"There's no way you
can come between a
cow and a calf and live,"
Mintz said in an inter-
view Monday. "I'd rather
meet a grizzly."

But there was no attack.

Instead, Mintz be-
came the adopted moth-
er to a three-day-old
female moose calf that
now lives at the Yukon
Game Farm on the Tak-
hini Hot Springs Road.

Mintz came upon the moose on June 2 while strolling through
the woods about four kilometres from his cabin on the Alaska
Highway near Whitehorse.

"I heard it first, and I thought it was a bear, so I just dived
down and grabbed the two dogs and held them.

"I knew whatever it was didn't hear me, 'cause it was making
too much noise.

"When I saw it was calf sitting there, I was more worried.
I thought, 'I came between a cow and a calf, I'm in really big
trouble,' I stayed down there for about 20 minutes.

"I circled around the thing and saw it was a calf moose. So
then I snuck up on it and within 10 feet, it heard me. It started
crying just like a little baby."

That's when he realized it was alone.

The calf was probably a twin and left behind by its moth-
er, Mintz said. If the mother had been shot, he said, the calf
would have stayed with the mother and the hunters would
have gotten it.

"It wouldn't have lasted overnight. There's no doubt about it.
It's like Grand Central Station out there for coyotes."

He stroked the calf, grabbed it, put it on his shoulders and
marched four kilometres back to his cabin with it.

"After about maybe an hour or two, it figured I was its mother.
If I walked away from it, it would start crying."

The calf wasn't afraid of people, he said. It liked his dogs, his
friend's cat, and gave his guests big moose-lip kisses.

It would cry to eat, lay down, and go outside because it wanted
Mintz to be closer to it.

It was three days old, so it couldn't follow him far. It would
walk for a while, then stop and cry when Mintz continued.

"I entertained thoughts at one point in time of keeping it,"
Mintz said. But he decided it would be better for the moose if
it went to the game farm. Danny Nowlan, owner of the Yukon
Game Farm, is an old friend of Mintz's father.


Nowlan has had a bull moose for about 10 years, said Mintz,
and he hasn't be able to find a cow.

So, this could be the beginning of a Yukon moose family bred
in captivity.

ROAD AGENT**

**Masked Highwayman
Holds Up a Stage in Real
Western Style and Gets \$3.55**

Atlin has had a genuine stage holdup. The work of the robber was shockingly crude. His method, or rather lack of it, demonstrated that he was not an expert in the profession, and that he was thoroughly in want of experience.

It happened Monday evening, Sept. 16, about 8 o'clock. Walker's stage was enroute to Pine City from Atlin when a masked highwayman stepped out in the road and at the point of a Winchester commanded the driver to halt. The command was obeyed and the passengers were ordered to get out of the stage and line up with their hands in the air. Four of the passengers, Messrs. D. Patterson, C.H. Dewitt, J. Dillon and Mrs. Nelson took to the woods. The others were Driver Walker, Photographer Draper, T. Shirley, W. Waters, J. Emmett and Miss Maud Biggs.

They had considerable money about them, but most of them managed to lose their purses in the stage before leaving it. The highwayman's order to them, therefore, to throw their money in a pile on the road resulted in only \$3.55 being contributed to the road agent. This he sulkily picked up, and backing into the brush, he disappeared.

The police were immediately notified and vigorous search made for the daring robber, but up to late reports he has not been caught.

**MARTHA BENJAMIN:
CANADIAN CHAMP**

“Martha beats them all” a STAR headline proclaimed in 1963 when an Old Crow skier and mother of five children became the first Yukoner to win a national skiing title.

Twenty-five year old Martha Benjamin won the senior women's cross country skiing title at the Canadian championships in Midland, Ontario. Her time over the 10 kilometre race was 43.29 minutes. And in 1989, 26 years after that historic event, Benjamin was inducted in the Yukon Sports Hall of Fame. “After all these years, I didn't expect to receive something like this,” she said. “I just had it in me that I wanted to do it, and I did it,” she said of her win in Midland Ontario.


Benjamin and Ben Charlie were the only two skiers to attend the championships. Charlie ranked 11th in a field of 48. His toughest competition came from a group of Finns from Sudbury who swept the field.

Both skiers brought high credit and distinction (not to mention the publicity) to their community and to the Yukon as a whole. Star correspondent Edith Josie wrote before they left: “I had wire from Mr. Harry at Whitehorse. He said Ben Charlie and Mrs. Martha Benjamin will go to Ottawa for International Olympic Competition for skiers on February 13. Frank Cook will take them out. Everyone is very glad to hear these two will go out long travel. Hope they had good trip. Old Crow is little town and Father Mouchet is training boys and girls for the skiers. Now they even go way out to Ottawa. Sure big surprise for the people in Old Crow.”

Mouchet, an experienced ski instructor for the French army, designed a training program which is now called TEST (Territorial Experimental Ski Training). This program strives to stimulate and motivate children to discover themselves, develop self-reliance through a rigorous training schedule and gain self-confidence through a series of tough, but surmountable challenges.

Wolves Attack Horses

Wolves, within a few miles of Whitehorse, caused the death of one horse and severely injured a second during the weekend. The two animals belonging to Douglas Lowe of 609 Alexander were pursued and bitten about the hindquarters at the northwest end of Marsh Lake.

Mr. Lowe found the wounded animals still on their feet but one was so badly injured he had to shoot it. The horses were part of the plans to use next season as a big game guide and outfitter.

He said he did not know how many wolves were involved but found many tracks in the vicinity adding that, "even one wolf can make plenty of tracks."

Whitehorse West Councillor Bert Boyd gave the okay to Game Director J.B. Fitzgerald to put poison bait out on the ice in an effort to stop the mauraders. This approval is necessary within 75 miles of settled areas

under the recently-amended game ordinance. Outside this radius the game director has full authority with regard to poison bait.

Today Mr. Fitzgerald commented his department was carrying out a poison program within the limits of its financial ability.

Game outfitters and guides see this year as a bad one for game in the Yukon bush. With the snow building a firm crust on which the wolves can travel but the game cannot, moose, caribou, elk and deer are easy prey for the carnivores.

Reports from the Peel River area indicate that the pickings are so good for wolves they are killing caribou and leaving them which is a virtually unheard of occurrence.

Wolves over the NWT border were said to be preying on herds with ease this year. One report told of a thousand animal herd literally hemmed in by wolves in the Nahanni country.
