Little was it thought when the original "Discovery Well" was drilled in 1928 in the Fort Norman area that, through the exigencies of war, the oil that flowed from there would be piped to Whitehorse, a distance of 595 miles, and refined here. The transportation of men and equipment over a road more than a thousand miles long was one of the major obstacles encountered and overcome. Camps, warehouses and platforms were constructed and pre-fabricated, barges, tugs assembled and Camp Canol was established. In June 1942 the U.S. Engineer troops arrived in Waterways, a small frontier town northeast of Edmonton, and the men of the navigation system in Norman Wells on the Mackenzie River. By the summer of 1943 the water system had been well established, in the meantime another route from Dawson Creek, B.C. to Whitehorse on the Alaska Highway had been opened. This pioneer road was completed in November 1942 and converted into an all-weather military highway by October 1943.

As the transportation systems came into operation crews started from Whitehorse and Norman Wells to construct the Canol access road at both ends. This road was completed in December 31, 1943 and in the following February (1944) the first weld was made in the 595 -mile pipeline. On April 30, 1944 the official opening of the refinery was fittingly commemorated.

## COLD WEATHER TAKEN IN STRIDE BY OLDTIMERS IN EARLY DAYS

Bouts of cold weather seem to bring out lots of tall tales but in reality the people who live through extreme temperatures just sort of tough it out. Longtime Yukon resident Emil Forrest recalls the winter of 1908 when it was 72 below in Dawson City.
He kept on attending school and even delivered papers on the coldest day. His brother had the route for the old "Klondike Nugget." Emil remembers but for some reason he got the job that time. After he finished his route he just went home, like any other day.

White Pass railroader George Barry recalls one winter he froze his face 15 times before he could grow a beard for protection.
One of the coldest years in the Yukon was 1917. At Christmas that season it was 75 below in Whitehorse. According to a report written at the time, the fog that day was so thick a person could almost separate a chunk of it with a circular motion of the hand. W.D. MacBride was here then and he remembers if a cup of water was thrown high in the air, it would come down with a rattle.

It was even colder that year in Dawson, but Yukon-born Johnny Hoggan tells a story of going out on a hike with another youngster and getting almost halfway to Fort Macpherson before turning back. They were 28 days out on the trail.

The coldest trip he ever made came many years later for Johnny, when he travelled from Dawson to Mayo in 1954. He started out December 9 at 40 below. As it turned out, that was the warmest temperature the whole trip. Driving a small cat, which had no cabin, Johnny got to Mayo to find it 67 below.

On boxing day it "warmed up" to 58 below so he left with a companion to head for the junction, 34 miles away. It was -72 there and on the next lap of their journey to Clear Creek, the mercury stayed at 72 below all the way. When he finally got home to Dawson January 5, 40 below seemed like summer time.

While he was away that month, Mrs. Hoggan remembers she burned four cords of wood to keep a small cabin warm.
In spite of all his experiences in cold winters, Johnny says he still isn't used to the cold.

upert the Robin's winter migration came late but it sure was fast.
It took Rupert only about seven hours Friday to fly 925 miles from Whitehorse to Vancouver. And he didn't have to move a feather.
Rupert came the easy way - on a mercy flight that saved him from almost certain death by starvation or freezing.
Whitehorse car dealer Bill Drury first spotted Rupert Nov. 10 munching berries on the mountain ash in front of his living room window.
As the days went by Drury and his wife grew concerned that Rupert didn't fly south to join his fellow robins who had left a month earlier.
On Thursday they decided Rupert needed some assistance.
"It was 17 below zero, the coldest day yet, and the winds were strong, 25 miles an hour," said Drury. "I don't think the poor little thing would have lasted another day."
He snared Rupert in his hat, thawed him out in the house and fed him snow from a teaspoon and cranberries impaled on broom straws.
A wildlife expert told him that the bird would have little change of surviving the Yukon winter, so Drury decided to arrange Rupert's migration for him.
He got co-operation from Whitehorse Star publisher Bob Erlam and Canadian Pacific Airlines, and Rupert was booked onto flight 22 Friday afternoon with a supply of cranberries from Drury's deep-freeze.
"When I saw him off he was as fit as blueberry pie. Better make that mountain ash berry pie," said Drury. Rupert was pampered by the stewardesses on the flight and met at Vancouver International Airport by Bill Bell chief inspector for the SPCA.
He spent the night at Bell's home.
"He's pretty perky," Bell said today. "I got him some mountain ash berries from a bush up the street."
He said he planned to release Rupert in Stanley Park later on in the day.

Rupert should feel at home there.
"We have lots of mountain ash bushes," said Stanley Park zoo curator Alan Best. "And they're loaded with berries this year."
